#### Central Bedfordshire Council's Local Plan

Consultation on the draft Local Plan closed on the 29 August 2017. Central Bedfordshire Council will now be considering all comments gathered during the consultation period. It is anticipated that they will publish their pre-submission Local Plan in Spring 2018, again there will be a public consultation period of eight weeks on this document. #### Houghton Regis Town Council's Neighbourhood Plan

Houghton Regis Town Council knew that it needed to face the challenges and maximise the opportunities of the growth that was being planned for the Town. Therefore the Town Council committed itself, following community consultation, to producing a Neighbourhood Plan. A Neighbourhood Plan enables local people, whether they work or live in the Town, to shape the future of land use.

Whilst Central Bedfordshire Council is preparing plans for the whole area from Luton to Bedford, the Town Council is working on a Neighbourhood Plan for Houghton Regis. A Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group, comprising of town councillors and local people, are looking at issues like the future of the town centre, education facilities and the parish's open spaces. Of course the new development at Houghton Regis North will bring big changes, doubling the population and with a new arterial road pushing east and west across the South East of England.

The Steering Group will be developing ideas over the next few months and everyone's input is important. ## **Houghton Regis Cemetery**

The Town Council has been honoured to have been able to offer residents of the Town a tranquil cemetery in which to inter loved ones and to visit them in due course. It is acknowledged that the Cemetery is a valued facility within the town and the Council are committed to ensuring this continues.

Inevitably as time has progressed the Cemetery has become increasingly occupied. In planning for the future the Town Council has sought to secure a new cemetery site through emerging planning applications and through investigations into existing areas of green open space to see if they could be converted. It was with deep regret that the Council were not successful in securing a new cemetery site within the plans for HRN1 and HRN2 and although hope remains that other land in proximity to these developments may come forward in due course it cannot be guaranteed. Residents can be assured that the Council will continue to monitor and explore options as they arise in future years.

However the need remains to provide interment space within the town. To meet this challenge within the confines of the existing cemetery the Council has worked with a cemetery design expert to maximise the space and opportunities available within the current site and plans have been drawn up to utilise the area to the right of the main entrance gateway. The memorial garden plans include for paved walk ways, peaceful reflective areas and a variety of cremated remains interment options / styles.

However in seeking to maximise on the space available the Council has come to the difficult decision to cease full body burials once the existing body burial space has been completed. Whilst it is acknowledged that this may present a great disappointment to some as personal burial choices may not be able to be met within a person's home town, the Council is confident that the high specification design of the new area will provide an exceptionally beautiful and tranquil interment space for many years to come. It is hoped that this new area will provide for interment space for the next 40-50 years.

## Crime Prevention ADVICE AND INFORMATION




#### **WINTER CRIME**

The darker winter nights, and particulary the period leading up to and over Christmas, present their own problems when it comes to crime.

#### Shopping safely and sensibly

- Be aware of your belongings when you're in a crowd there may be pickpockets around.
- Put your purse or wallet away before leaving the till don't let staff or other customers rush you.
  - Take care at the ATM be wary of people standing too close for comfort – try and use an ATM inside the bank.





- Park in a busy and well-lit area.
- Leave personal and valuable items at home.
- If you must have them in the car, store them in the boot before you leave.
- Don't store your bought goods in the car and then return to the shops for more - you don't know who may be watching in the car park.
- Late night shopping may be more convenient, but do take care and take someone with you if possible.

#### Time for a security health check

- Check outdoor security lights and replace blown bulbs.
- Check padlocks, hasps and hinges on your outside doors for wear and tear, and replace them.
- Many people have freezers in the garage Christmas food and alcohol is vulnerable - and don't forget new bicycles are also at risk!
- Has your house alarm been serviced recently?
- If you don't have an alarm, you can always buy a battery operated single room alarm to protect your hallway, shed or garage.

#### Protecting your home while you are out

- Use timer switches to operate lights and radios tuned to a talk radio station in the house when you are out.
- Although the tree looks lovely in the window, don't leave the lights on and curtains open when you go out - and don't leave presents under the tree!

- If you go on holiday, ask a neighbour or friend to pick up your past – they can also park their car on your drive
- After Christmas, dispose of boxes and packaging carefully - don't leave them on the roadside or on the top of the wheelie bin.

#### **Unexpected visitors**

- Bogus Callers: pretending to be from a utilities company (water, gas, electricity, phone, even police).
- Distraction Burglars: one will keep you at your door with an excuse (eg, looking for an address or a lost ball/dog) while an accomplice commits the burglary round the back.
- Cold Callers: hard-sell sales reps who turn up without an appointment and won't leave till you have signed a contract.
- Rogue Traders: unqualified workmen offering to do jobs on your home, usually for cash, often badly and very expensively.

#### Genuine unexpected visitors

- Utilities staff with ID regarding emergency repairs
- Political groups canvassing for election purposes
- Charity collectors with ID and charity number
- Emergency Services staff on production of warrant card or official identification
- Religious groups and carol singers
- People delivering business flyers
- Whoever it is, before you answer the door, check all back doors and windows are closed - if it's a genuine caller, they won't mind waiting a few extra seconds.
- If you're not sure, don't open the door!

#### Property marking - Why do it?

- Acts as a deterrent to thieves as it makes selling on stolen goods very difficult.
- Increases the chances of your property being returned to you.
- Helps the police build a strong case against the offender.
- Many different ways of property marking:
   UV pen: electrical items, bikes, etc
   Etching: power tools and equipment
   Smartwater: can be used on any item
   Use your house number/name and postcode
- Remember to register your valuables on www.immobilise.com

## **Spotlight on the Community**

## 1. How long has the club been running?

Houghton Regis Craft and Coffee was formed back in April 2013 by a group of ladies who were all interested in Crafting in one way or another. They wanted somewhere to get together where they could socialise, share crafting experience and have that all important cup of coffee and chat.

## 2. How many members do you have to date?

We currently have just over thirty members on our books. They are aged from 18 to ladies of retirement age and beyond.

## 3. Who runs the club and who does the teaching?

The club is run by a committee of volunteers who have been voted in by other members. We are "Non Profit" making club and have our Constitution, Rules and Code of Conduct to adhere to, but don't worry we are all very relaxed and friendly at our sessions. Sometimes we hold a "Workshop", where either a Guest crafter or one of our members will show you how to do a craft so that you can then try it for yourselves. My personal favourite workshop is on Water Colour Painting, where a lovely lady called Julie will demonstrate how to paint a scene and then we try and copy it. Other workshops are on Iris Folding, Book Folding, Glitz Art, Card Making, actually there's a long list.

#### 4. What's the most popular craft?

There is a lot of knitting going on, sewing, cross stitching, crochet, felting, card making. The best thing is if you have a problem with your craft, there's always someone who can advise and give a helping hand.

## 5. How do you think the club is received within the community?

We asked for community involvement on some of our projects and in fact we have had a really great response to some of our



Appeals. We asked the community for help in knitting squares so that we could make up blankets for the needy and the response was so great we were not only inundated with squares but wool as well. They helped with our project on knitting Twiddlemuffs and knitted dolls for Dementia patients. Helped with knitting "Fish and Chip" jumpers and hats for the new born babies of Africa.

At Easter, we asked for paper daffodils and had the lovely job of putting the hundreds of daffodils that were made on display to brighten the Library complex.

## 6. How do residents/community ioin the club?

We meet every second Wednesday and the last Friday of the month at the Community Centre, between 10am and 3pm. We invite you to just pop along to see us and have a cuppa and see for yourselves what is going on, the first session is free. If you decide you like us and want to join us then it's a yearly membership of just £5 and £3 a session with workshops being extra. We have lots of different equipment and materials for your use, either come along and try a new craft or bring your own craft with you. Stay all day or just an

hour or two but most importantly bring your Mug we supply the tea, coffee or hot chocolate.

## 7. Have you any exciting plans for the club for Christmas?

We most certainly do! We like to decorate the Library Complex, whether it's for an Easter Fair or a Christmas Fair. We have had themes at Easter on "Follow the Rainbow" to "Host of Golden Daffodils", last Christmas we had the "Gingerbread House" and this year we are hoping to get the community, community groups and local schools involved with our "Christmas Tree" theme. We are hoping for a virtual forest of little Christmas trees, plus bigger ones that can be decorated with seasonal wishes and where community groups and schools can promote themselves on their trees. We are also holding a Christmas Craft Fair on Saturday 25th November and are looking forward to some Carol's performed by a local school. Oh yes! Forgot to mention our Club members also get a visit from our very own "Secret Santa".

## **Houghton Hall Park Visitor Centre Opens to the Public**



The brand new Houghton Hall Park Visitor Centre in Houghton Regis has opened its doors thanks to a £2.1m National Lottery grant from the Heritage Lottery Fund (HLF) and the Big Lottery Fund together with funding from Central Bedfordshire Council and Houghton Regis Town Council.

The brand new visitor centre is situated in the historic eighteenth century parkland of Houghton Hall. The fully accessible centre is home to two bookable meeting rooms, a discovery and learning corner, as well as a fully equipped café offering a wide range of drinks, light bites and meals to cater for all tastes.

The centre is free to visit and has free parking (for three hours) and is open all year, it is also fully accessible and has access to toilet facilities including an accessible toilet.

The centre forms part of the wider Houghton Hall Park Renaissance and Renewal Project which has also restored the formal garden adjacent to Houghton Hall, reinstated the kitchen garden, provided easy access paths and installed innovative natural play equipment around the park, making Houghton Hall Park a great destination for all of the family.

Caroline Romans, Project Manager at Central Bedfordshire Council said: "It has been a real team effort with lots of challenges. It's down to the hard work, creativity, and the help of some fantastic people that we have this beautiful visitor centre. We are looking forward to holding

a large family event in May as a celebration for the full project when the planting is starting to bloom, but we didn't want to delay the opportunity for the local community to enjoy the visitor facilities as soon as they were ready."

The Visitor Centre will be open to the pubic

between 10am – 5.30pm Monday to Friday and 9:00am – 5:30pm on Saturday and Sunday until the end of October. Thereafter they change to the winter opening hours of 10:00am – 3:00pm on weekdays, and 9:00am – 3:00pm on weekends.

# SPOTLIGHT ON BUSINESS Business Interview with...



#### 1. How long has Striker Beats been running for?

Striker Beats has been running for a number of months now, the first session took place on 14th July 2017.

## 2. What kinds of services do you provide to the community?

We provide multi-sports sessions for children aged 4 to 11 years, covering a range of different sports from individual ball skills to team games. The session is run with child appropriate music in the background to help set the friendly, fun and non-competitive atmosphere. Striker Beats also has a set party package which they offer to the community.

#### 3. How do you promote these services?

Striker Beats has its own website and Facebook page which contains information on session content, prices, party packages as well as a section on meet the coaches. In addition to this, Striker Beats canvasses leaflets on a regular basis around local areas to remind the community of our services and what we offer.

#### 4. When do you run these services?

The sessions currently run on a Friday evening at Hawthorn Lower School in Houghton Regis and Saturday mornings at the Pioneer and Community Youth Centre in Dunstable.

#### 5. What is a typical day like?

A typical session for Striker Beats consists of practicing numerous sporting skills, team work and leadership skills.

At the end of each session, the coaches vote the Star of the Week, this child receives a certificate and a gift from the coaches. This is given to the child who shows kindness and encouragement to all the other children during the session.

#### 6. What do you want kids to take from the service?

Our aim is to promote physical activity in a fundamental way. We want all children of every ability to enjoy playing sports and feel comfortable doing so.

## 7. What are your biggest problems/challenges you face?

The biggest challenge we face is trying to make our business well known around the local community; this was prior to the website being made.

## 8. Does your organisation take part in any kind of special events?

Due to Striker Beats being a newly formed business we haven't had the opportunity in doing so, however we do plan to in the upcoming future.

#### 9. What are the organisation's plans for Christmas?

For the weeks running up to Christmas we intend on making the sessions very festive, with dressing up, Christmas music and a few surprises for the children.




